Welcome to Fall of the 2021-22 school year. It has been about 16 months since I became the Superintendent of the Mount Vernon School District. This is a tremendous honor and I value the trust put in me by the school board, families, staff, and community. I have learned so much this last year and, in some respects, this year feels like my first year. It has been heartening to learn about the many different learning options our students have available to them like our Transitional Kindergarten, 6 elementary schools, 2 middle schools, Mount Vernon High School, NCTA (Northwest Career and Technical Academy), Aspire Academy, Skagit Academy, and Open Doors both at NCTA and Skagit Valley College. Additionally, we have a new online learning program called Mount Vernon Virtual Learning (MVVL).

Equally as valuable is the great partnership we have formed with organizations like the United Way, who's bold goal is that by 2025, all Skagit children entering Kindergarten are ready to learn. This, of course, aligns well with our district's vision and mission. We continue to partner with organizations like SPARC (Skagit Preschool and Resource Center), Children of the Valley, Boys and Girls Club, and the YMCA just to name a few. These organizations have walked beside us during these times to provide both educational and social emotional supports for our students and families. These partnerships demonstrate the depth and breadth of how our community works together to support student learning and well-being.

This fall, my focus has been on making sure the district developed the best way to teach our students as we have returned to full in-person learning, while ensuring the health and safety of our students, staff, and families. We understand that we are still not back to our 'normal' pre-COVID learning environment, so we continue to put into practice the health and safety measures needed to provide safe learning conditions for our students. Superintendent of Public Instruction, the Skagit County Public Health, and community partners to provide academic and social/emotional learning supports for our students and families.

In this issue, you will learn about our Transportation department, the status of our construction projects - made possible by your support of the 2016 Bond, how our Bulldog alum have used their education and experiences to enhance their community, and much more. These big picture projects come down to one common goal - "100% of our students will graduate with the knowledge and skills necessary to be successful in post-secondary education, careers, and life." That includes the kindergarten student learning how to be a part of a classroom, the 3rd grader celebrating their accomplishment of reading at grade level, the 6th grade student finding new opportunities to learn through a wide choice of electives, and the high school student successfully completing their math course or earning their seal of biliteracy. Student success comes from every teacher, every family, every community partner, and every student.

As a district, we were charged with developing a plan that will keep our students healthy, safe, engaged, supported, and challenged. While we are not fully back to the learning environments we are accustomed to, it takes all of us to do our part to provide optimal learning conditions for our students. Getting vaccinated, wearing face covering, frequent hand washing, social distancing, etc., are some of the more promising safety measures that are designed to create those conditions. In the event that we are not able to continue basic education in-person learning due to a disruption, the district has a Continuity of Operations Plan (COOP) in place to address such disruptions if needed.

We will continue to work closely with the state's Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction, Governor's office, state and county Health Departments, community partners, and our district neighbors to determine what is best for our students as we move forward throughout the school year. With the continued challenges and opportunities that lay ahead, we know that by working together with our community and listening to the important messages being shared, we will give our students the education, security, and emotional well-being they need and deserve.

Construction Update

As students headed back to school this fall, the improvements to Old Main continued. Outside the building the two new stair towers are beginning to be erected. These contribute to the seismic upgrade of the building and they will improve student flow during passing times. Inside the building, additional seismic work is occurring. The auditorium has been expanded and will be a beautiful venue upon completion.

While Old Main is unavailable to students this year, freshmen are being housed at Lincoln School. Freshmen spend either their Green Day or their White Day at Lincoln, with the other day spent on the main campus. Named MVHS South Campus, Lincoln has provided a positive and calm learning climate for our 9th graders. Additionally, over the summer three portables were relocated from Little Mountain to MVHS to provide additional classroom space on campus. These portables will be removed when Old Main is completed, which is scheduled for the summer of 2022.

From being a Bulldog graduate, to working as the Skagit County Parks and Recreation Manager, Tony Tewalt has a long history of being part of the Mount Vernon community. Tony grew up in Mount Vernon, and attended the Mount Vernon Schools. As a child, he attended Jefferson Elementary, LaVenture Middle School and Mount Vernon High School. Tony graduated from Mount Vernon High School in 1989 and went on to attend Washington State University.

Tony knew he wanted to work in a sports management field, and after he graduated from WSU, he returned to his hometown to work as the Skagit County Parks and Recreation Manager, and has been building the organized sports league ever since.

Fast-forward to March 2020, a time when things in the Skagit area were beginning to close down due to COVID. Organized sports were placed on hold. Tony quickly adjusted to the need at hand. He began to utilize his skills in a manner that once again benefited not only Skagit County, but Mount Vernon Schools. As a way to help support the city of Mount Vernon, Tony switched roles and became the Logistics Coordinator assisting the Skagit County Emergency Management Department in disseminating Personal Protective Equipment (PPE). The goal was to get the much needed PPE organized and distributed to those organizations who were in need. This included care facilities, hospitals, and schools.

Parks & Recreation Director, Brian Adams, said, “As the pandemic emerged and recreational activities subsided, Tony stepped into a new role as the logistics coordinator to bring PPE and other resources to the schools and throughout Skagit County. Tony provided expertise in this role due to his experience and expertise. Tony has had over twenty years of experience in putting together basketball tournaments with over one hundred participating teams. Anyone who navigates the logistics in coordinating the necessary gym space, referees, scorekeepers, and other resources for a tournament this large has the perfect skill set for moving supplies where they need to be during an emergency. It’s just another way Tony found a way to serve the community when there was a need.”



Tony recently received Mount Vernon School District’s Community Bulldog Award for his contribution in securing PPE for the schools. “Tony was supportive and responsive and presented a can-do attitude to support our schools, students and staff in Mount Vernon” said MVSD Assistant Superintendent, Bill Nutting.



Tony has since moved back to organizing youth sports teams for Skagit County Parks and Recreation. Currently he is working on organizing a Fall 2021 MV Girls Basketball Club for students in 4th-8th grade. These groups allow students of every skill and income level to participate.

When asked what he appreciates about his Mount Vernon School District experience, Tony said “I like the diversity of the district. I can appreciate that having kids in the district. I know Mount Vernon schools has great teachers at every level, and students are receiving the best.”

Transportation Services

Did you know that the transportation department transports approximately 4700 students to and from school on any given school day? This is all due to the dedicated employees within the transportation department. Supervisor Kelly Johnson employs 42 bus drivers, 10 part time substitute drivers, 17 bus monitors, 4 office staff and 3 mechanics. Along with the daily transportation, the team buses our students to extracurricular, sporting, and many other events throughout the year. This fall, the Mount Vernon School District awarded the transportation department with the “Bulldog Award” for their hard work and dedication to our students. Way to go team!
