All for Literacy, Literacy for All

The 2022-2023 school year began Year I of our Literacy for All, All for Literacy efforts in elementary schools across the Mount Vernon School District! These efforts began in response to brain-based research about how the brain learns how to read, as well as to the nationwide need to make changes to the ways in which students are taught how to read and write in elementary school.

In June, the Mount Vernon School Board approved American Reading Company as the new K-5 elementary literacy curriculum. American Reading Company or ARC, is a knowledge building curriculum whose mission is to ensure that every student is reading and writing on or above grade level. ARC uses a structured approach to teach foundational reading and writing skills, and is designed to build and sustain a child's love of reading within and beyond the classroom.

In addition to the adoption of a new literacy curriculum, all elementary schools across the district use a common daily schedule that was created based on research about the amount of time students need to spend engaged in literacy instruction in order to accelerate their literacy skills. This schedule also provides a teacher facilitated recess time during which your child's teacher will address the daily needs of the class to determine if they would most benefit from outdoor unstructured play, outdoor structured play (ie. class game of tag, etc), indoor free play, or an indoor structured game. Intentional opportunities to teach and re-teach students how to play together emerged as an important take away from the 2021-2022 school year.

With an increase in instructional minutes in the area of literacy, with new curricular resources, and with a district-wide elementary daily schedule, we expect to see an acceleration in students' love of reading and in their reading abilities.

Literacy for All, All for Literacy means that we all have a role to play in supporting the literacy development of our students. We

recently enlisted the help of all staff members...paraeducators, teachers, principals, board members, bus drivers, and district office staff to spend time reading books to individual or small groups of students, we are so grateful for the ways in which everyone is pitching in. We know that these hours of one-to-one reading WILL make all the difference in the lives of our students. We would love to invite the Mount Vernon community to join us in these efforts. If you'd like to volunteer to read to a student, please be sure to fill out the district's volunteer application, which can be found on our website. You can reach out to your child's school, or a school nearby, to get signed up for this opportunity and help our students gain the skills they need to be successful.

Construction Update

On September 28, the District held a ceremonial ribbon cutting event to celebrate the remodel of Old Main on the MVHS campus. The celebration included student-led tours, Folklorico dancing in the rejuvenated auditorium, MVHS Cheerleaders and the MVHS Band. The ribbon cutting also celebrated the 100th birthday of this beautiful building and many alumni reminisced about their days on campus.

While finishing minor details to conclude construction this month, Old Main has been open for students since the first day of school on September 7th. Other construction-related details are also wrapping up across campus with the installation of new fencing and gates, landscaping improvements and minor upgrades to the Ag building.

The final piece of the 2016 Bond will support adding space at LaVenture Middle School. This addition is scheduled to break ground in April 2023 and be completed in November 2023. It will include a maker space, classroom spaces and special education spaces. The addition will connect to the Southwest corner of the existing building.

Student Focused Balanced Calendar

As we continue to move forward in learning about and exploring a Student Focused Balanced Calendar (SFBC), I want to keep you informed and updated. The MVSD Board began discussing and exploring the concept of a modified calendar as it is one of the policy priorities of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. The interest also stemmed from the concern in learning loss (summer slide) due to long summer breaks.

The district applied for and received a state grant for the purpose of exploring the concept of a modified calendar. There were no outcome expectations set by the grant.

In 2021-2022 we initiated the Student Focused Balanced Calendar (SFBC) work. This included learning from other districts, state-wide summits, school visits, and book studies.

As we continue to learn, explore, and plan this year, a SFBC Steering Committee composed of MVSD parents, staff, students, community members and labor partners has begun working to share learn and share ideas about what a SFBC might look like. The committee began meeting in October 2022 and will continue through Spring of 2023 to provide direction and guidance on the SFBC to the Superintendent and to serve as a representative of

our school district and <u>comm</u>unity.

Commissioner Bowers

A lifelong resident of Skagit County, Bonnie Bowers was elected to the Port of Anacortes Board of Commissioners in 2019. Bonnie is one of five Port Commissioners who set policy, establish the Port's long range plans, and acts as steward of public assets. Job creation, economic development, environmental issues, property acquisition, and maintenance of Port assets like buildings and docks, are all areas the Commission considers. For Bowers, it is all about finding a balance between sustainable economic development, while ensuring that the fragile marine environment is preserved for future generations.

Bonnie is a Mount Vernon High School alumni who attended Mount Vernon schools throughout her educational career. As she thought back about her time in our district, she remembers the quality of teachers that she had throughout her years in Mount Vernon. From her kindergarten teacher at Roosevelt School (which is now the District Office) to high school teachers, Bonnie was reminded of their impact on her life "I had fabulous teachers who were creative and encouraged us to be creative."

After graduating from Mount Vernon High School, Bonnie graduated from Washington State University with a BA, and graduated from the FBI National Academy. She used her education and expertise throughout her career in law enforcement. Bonnie spent 33 years working in public safety, culminating with her last nine years as the Anacortes Police Chief.

She retired from police work in 2017, and continues giving back to her community through her work at the Port, and as an active volunteer.

Bonnie volunteers in local schools as a reading tutor. "We have to support local education not only with our tax dollars, we also have to support students with our time, by volunteering and attending events at local schools. Let students know they are important to us, we value their efforts, and are proud of them. We want them to succeed in life, and someday give back to their community. After all, our kids are our hope for the future."
