



Featured Alumni-Michael Baughn Our Alumni are working to change the world around us

Michael Baughn's path in the field of ALS (Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis) research is a testament to his passion, dedication, scientific acumen, and mentorship. Starting from his early education in Mount Vernon, Baughn's journey took him through prestigious institutions like the University of Washington and University of California, San Diego (UCSD), culminating in his current position as a successful scientist in the field. This article retraces Baughn's educational and professional milestones, shedding light on his significant contributions to ALS research.

Michael's academic journey began in Jefferson Elementary, Washington Elementary, and LaVenture Middle School before he graduated from Mount Vernon High School in 2005. Following his high school graduation, Baughn pursued a Bachelor of Science degree in Cell, Molecular and Developmental Biology with a Genome Science Focus at the University of



Working with Dr. Ravits led Baughn to UCSD, where he delved deeper into ALS research through their collaborations with Dr. Don W. Cleveland, Ph.D, Dr. Clotilde Lagier-Tourenne, MD, PhD, and Ionis Pharmaceuticals. Together, working with patient samples and cell lines this work led to a research program targeting the most common genetic cause of ALS and frontotemporal dementia (FTD), a repeat expansion in the gene C9ORF72 that Baughn worked on for three years before publishing his results and applying to PhD training programs..

For his graduate training Baughn then joined the laboratory of the world-renowned and highly distinguished Professor Dr. Don W. Cleveland, where he worked with Dr. Ze'ev Melamed and Dr. Jone Lopez-Erauskin on groundbreaking work, which highlighted the significance of a specific gene called stathmin-2 in ALS. Together, with studies published in the journals Nature Neuroscience and Science they demonstrated how stathmin-2, a protein required for neurons to regenerate after damage and maintain their connection to muscles, is lost in ~97% of ALS, then determined the underlying mechanisms, and demonstrated therapeutic approaches for corrective human clinical..

Throughout his journey, Baughn's love for science and the joy of research have been the driving forces behind his accomplishments. He recalls his early days as a student, taking advantage of opportunities to explore every scientific course offered at MVHS. Baughn's academic counselor helped foster his scientific curiosity, allowing him to waive physical education credits in exchange for immersing himself in science courses (accepting his >1,000 hours of volunteer search and rescue time with the local Sheriff's department as a substitute). This diverse exposure laid the foundation for his eventual specialization and career in molecular biology.

Baughn acknowledges the immense challenges that come with scientific research. Working on groundbreaking projects, publishing papers, and collaborating with pharmaceutical companies require unwavering dedication and perseverance. However, for Baughn, the rewards far outweigh the difficulties. The ability to contribute as part of a scientific team to a greater understanding of ALS and the potential to develop therapies that could alleviate the suffering of patients is the best part of his job.

Michael Baughn's remarkable journey from a high school graduate to a respected scientist in ALS research showcases the power of passion, perseverance, and scientific inquiry. Through his education and work at renowned institutions, and with renowned mentors, Baughn has made significant contributions to our understanding of ALS, bringing us closer to effective treatments for this devastating disease.

Taking advantage of the chance to visit his family and friends in the Skagit Valley, Baughn makes a point to stop by his old high school to catch up with the teachers who supported him throughout his academic journey. Among his favorite memories are the classes taught by Lisa and Craig Harpel, Paul Hope, John Sullivan, and Brian Hanrahan.
