Student Safety

As our day to day activities become more routine, we wanted to take this opportunity to renew our focus on student safety. MVSD administrator, Eric Monson, has begun this process with the district's Emergency Management team. The Mount Vernon School District will work closely with the emergency liaison from the Northwest Educational Service District (NWESD) to make sure all plans meet or exceed the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) standards. Our first goal is to ensure that all schools within the district are up-to-date and prepared for emergencies. The District Emergency Management team will work directly with each building to update their action plan. We see this is a great opportunity to improve our communication and create a stronger relationship with those involved in aiding the district during emergency situations. This includes local agencies such as Mount Vernon Police and fire departments. Safety is a high priority for the district, and our goal is to continue improving our system, as a team. Diversity in the Classroom

The Mount Vernon School District will have an opportunity to host four exchange teachers this summer. "Districts can apply for the opportunity to bring in teachers from different regions in Mexico and we were fortunate enough to be one of two districts in the state of Washington to be selected as one of those districts" said David Rodriguez, Director of Equity and Inclusion.

These four exchange teachers have a wide variety of experiences and talents that will be shared with our students. They all have unique skill sets that can be utilized in the classroom, which include specialties in History, Cultural Arts, and Ethnic studies, just to name a few. All of the exchange teachers are bilingual and will be placed in a classroom with one of our talented teachers.

"We are excited to give our students an opportunity to see and be taught by teachers who come from similar backgrounds and cultures," said Rodriguez. Students will have an opportunity to experience the diverse offerings these teachers bring during this year's summer school program.

Mental Health

Students all over the country are struggling with mental health issues on a daily basis. The district is currently using the Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) model which helps us increase our strategies and our skills in early detection of identifying students in need. This model gives our staff the tools they need to support our students, as well as providing services to students who need additional assistance. Part of this program involves teachers working on social/emotional learning lessons with students. Students take part in weekly lessons with their teacher, where they are given an opportunity to talk about, and practice social/ emotional skills. When students are involved in learning about social/emotional skills, they enjoy school more, and have better relationships with their peers, and their academics improve as well. The district has also hired additional mental health professionals, including school counselors and social workers, who are able to address a wide variety of student needs in our schools. The school counselors are able to work with students at school, while the social workers can assist whole families by connecting them with resources and connections outside of the school, and within the community. If you are interested in learning more about programs that will help your child's social/ emotional needs, please contact your school counselor at your building, or talk to your building principal, as they can connect you with our mental health professionals.

Cultural Opportunties for Teachers

The district has teamed up with the University of Oaxaca to bring Spanish dialect courses to teachers. Teachers had an opportunity to enroll in either Spanish or Mixtec language courses, and both courses are currently at full capacity. We have 40 teachers enrolled in the Native Spanish/Mixtec course and 30 teachers enrolled in the Spanish immersion course. These evening courses align with the district's Equity Action plan and give our teachers an opportunity to gain cultural experiences. Director of Equity & Inclusion, David Rodriguez, said these courses have been very popular, and they will be offering them again in the future, to teachers who did not get an opportunity to participate.

You will find our alumni working in every field imaginable, changing the world around us every day. Take a look at what our alumni are doing today and where they started. In this month's Community Link, we feature Brooke Holmes, who grew up and graduated from Mount Vernon High School. We took some time to ask Brooke questions about what she does for a living, and how she got there.

Tell me a little about yourself? Where did you go to college?

I grew up in the Skagit Valley and went to Columbia University for college.

What drew you to your profession?

I'm currently a professor in the Department of Classics at Princeton University. When I went to college, I thought that I would work for the State Department. I'd done cross-examination debate in high school and learned about current affairs. It was right after the collapse of the Soviet Union, so I wanted to study Russian. But I'd also always loved literature. Columbia has a required Core Curriculum, and taking a class called "Literature Humanities" rekindled my interest in literature, so I decided to major in comparative literature. I was taking Russian, and I needed another language quickly, so that was how I ended up in intensive ancient Greek. I didn't set out to become a scholar of ancient Greece and Rome. But I think I was drawn to the ancient Greco-Roman world because you can move across different disciplines and ask big questions. My research and teaching cross literature, the history of philosophy, science, and medicine, and the study of gender and sexuality. Recently I've worked more in the contemporary art world and thought about the history of studying "classical" antiquity, its promise and its problems. I love my work because the more I learn, the more questions I have. And I love teaching and mentoring: I'm always learning from my students.

Did you have a favorite teacher, or someone who inspired you when you were in school?

I was deeply inspired by so many incredible teachers at MVHS who fostered my intellectual curiosity and encouraged me to forge my own path, especially Ms. Johnson, Mr. Cornelius, Mr. Boyer, and Mr. Clark. After two years of the pandemic and now that I have kids of my own, I'm even more grateful to all teachers, especially those in public education, for their incredibly valuable work.

Do you ever visit the Skagit Valley, and if so what is your favorite part of the valley?

Yes, I've tried to come back a couple times of year to visit family. And now that I have traveled quite a bit, I can appreciate more than I could growing up how beautiful the valley is. I especially love being out on the flats in late afternoon. The light is often so incredible.

Brooke graduated from MVHS in 1994. She trained in the United States and Europe as a comparative and a classicist. She holds a B.A in Comparative Literature from Columbia University and an M.A. and Ph.D. in Comparative Literature from Princeton University. She also holds a D.E.A in Études grecques from the Sorbonne (Paris-IV). She has taught at Princeton since 2007.


